Career Choice:	

A. **Supply and Demand.** The more people want or need a thing (the demand) the more that thing will be produced (the supply) to fill that need. Supply and demand greatly influences the job market. The higher demand for a good or service, the more need for workers to fill that need. The lower the demand, the less workers needed. When there are too few workers to fill jobs that are open, it is a "workers" market - wages are higher, competition is less. When there are too many workers to fill the jobs that are open, it is an "employer's market" and there is more competition for the job openings and wages may be driven down as a result of the competition.

- B. **Globalization** is another factor that affects our job markets. The large number of aging people in America has increased the demand for health care services. Many factories are being moved out of the United States to countries where labor is cheaper. America's leading companies earn from 30-65 percent of their sales from foreign markets, according to the National Alliance for Business (1999). Nations, companies and employees are living in an increasingly interconnected world and the impact of globalization is profound.

- C. **Technology** is defined as the application of science, especially to industrial or commercial objectives. In the real world, technology has become synonymous with computers--personal computers to process words and data; computer aided drafting machines to develop blueprints and plans, computer aided robots to work on the assembly line, etc. The advents of e-mail and the internet have carried technology even further.

- D. **Environmental Issues.** There will be increasing concern over environmental issues. Should we ban the cutting of "old growth trees?" How do with deal with plants and animals that are endangered? Will local, state and national governments need more workers and more technology to deal with the problems of global warming, pollution, air quality, water quality, garbage, ozone and chemical and industrial wastes?

- E. **Demographics** is the study of the characteristics of human populations, such as size, growth, density, distribution and vital statistics. Projections by the U. S. Bureau of Census indicate that the West will continue to be the fastest growing region of the country. By 2000, the babyboomer generation, which makes up a large portion of the labor force, will be 45-64 years old. The work force will also change with the increased participation of women and ethnic minorities.

- F. **Occupational Outlook and Trends**. An occupational trend is a direction or movement of a particular occupation. An occupational outlook is a look at the future job prospects for a particular occupation. Nearly 80% of American workers are now employed by service-producing organizations as opposed to goods-producing organizations. Will the aging of the American population require increased health services? What are the implications of increased reliance on technology?
 - Occupational trends and outlooks are affected by many factors, including globalization, technology, supply and demand, the environment, etc. What is the occupational outlook for your career choice?
 - Are there any occupational trends that may affect your career choice?
